

How to Treat For Mice

Mice are mostly nocturnal, and their activity will be more intense at night. They see poorly and rely predominately on their sense of smell. This being the case you will most often find them moving along the edge of walls, venturing into open areas only when they smell something worth eating. Before any treatment is done, be sure to remove all potential food sources that may be used by rodents. This may include open garbage, dumpsters, dog food, grains, pantry food, bird feeders, cat food, any type of food not in a sealed plastic or metal container. Also remove any fruit from trees that has fallen to the ground.

Snap traps should be set in their paths along walls, behind sinks, next to foundations or behind appliances. Bait, but do not set the traps for two days. Allow the rodent to eat from the trap before setting it, so as not to induce bait shyness. After two days, re-bait and set the trap. If the trap springs, and a rodent is not caught, the chances of that trap working for that particular rodent again are slim.

Also use glue boards in the same areas of activity. Use for two days before removing the sticky tape. After the rodents have walked on the un-armed glue boards for a couple of days, remove the sticky tape, and adhere the traps to the floor with tape, screws or some fastening device. This will prevent mice from dragging the glue boards back to their borrows or nests.

Apply AC Formula 90 bait any where rodent activity has been seen, especially along walls and beside burrows. Be sure to keep out of reach of children, pets, domestic animals and non-target wildlife, or in “tamper-resistant” bait station. The bait stations (black boxes) included in your kit to not qualify as “tamper-resistant”. Do not place bait in areas where there is a possibility of contaminating food, water or surfaces that come into contact with food.

Use included bait stations to protect glue boards, snap traps, or bait from elements such as moisture and dust. As well, rodents typically feel safe crawling inside of something and then eating.
